## **ATTORNEY-GENERAL'S PORTFOLIO OVERVIEW**

The Attorney-General's portfolio supports the Attorney-General, the Hon Christian Porter MP, as First Law Officer.

Since the 2018-19 Budget, and under the Administrative Arrangements Order (AAO) of 10 May 2018, responsibilities for the Australian Security Intelligence Organisation and legislation relating to telecommunications interception and access and surveillance devices transferred from the Attorney-General's portfolio to the Home Affairs portfolio. Also under the AAO of 10 May 2018, responsibility for the Inspector-General of Intelligence and Security, the Independent National Security Legislation Monitor, the Commonwealth Ombudsman and public interest disclosure legislation transferred from the Prime Minister's portfolio to the Attorney-General's portfolio.

The portfolio now comprises the Attorney-General's Department and 13 agencies.
