It is not the government's place to collect the data in question in the first place. It is a violation of privacy, liberty and freedom. It constitutes totalitarian surveillance which benefits government and large corporations, and has no benefit to citizens.

Making the data available for security purposes is bad enough, but making it available for civil matters is abhorrent. It provides a large potential for abuse by large copyright holders. It is not the business of the government to provide technical assistance to those enforcing copyright.

This information can also be misused in order to defame, embarrass, defraud, blackmail or unfairly influence legal proceedings.

Extending the access to this data is a violation of the public's trust - the collection of this data was debated under the understanding that it would only be used for security purposes. Extending this to civil matters reveals an intent that many citizens suspected all along - that the whole purpose of the data collection was to appease the copyright lobby.
